ABLE Accounts and Employment



ABLE (Achieving a Better Life Experience) accounts are expected to become available in Oklahoma this year (Oklahomans may open ABLE accounts in other states currently). These accounts will allow people with disabilities on public benefits such as Medicaid to save up 15,000 dollars a year to pay for disability-related expenses.
