Data Breach of Information of People on the DDS Waitlist and their Families Violación de la información de las personas en la lista de espera del DDS y sus familias

A recent data breach of information of people on the Developmental Disabilities Services (DDS) Waiver Waitlist may have put the people on that list and their families at risk for identity theft and other kinds of fraud. Liberty, a health and services company contracted with the Oklahoma Department of Human Services (OKDHS), is offering those whose names may have been exposed a free 12 month subscription or account to a service that will monitor or watch for not approved credit activities. They can also offer services to help people if their identities are stolen. Liberty has updated the deadline to request monitoring services to June 30th, 2022. AMCHP Stands by Science and Urges Vaccination of Children Ages 5+ Against COVID-19

Vaccinations for children ages 5 and over are recommended by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and now the Association of Maternal & Child Health Programs (AMCHP). As of March 2022, only ~27% of children ages 5-11 were fully vaccinated against COVID-19. Read the full press release.
