Public Health is for Everyone: Inclusive Planning Toolkit for Public Health

A <u>resource database/toolkit</u> has been created that provides free information, products, and best practices to include people with disabilities in public health efforts. Users can search and browse disability and health related resources by their interests and professional needs. The resource database/toolkit was created by the Association of University Centers on Disability (AUCD) in collaboration with the Disability and Health Program, Division of Human Development and Disability, National Center on Birth Defects and Developmental Disabilities (NCBDDD), and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

L.E.A.D: Autism in the Workplace - A Workforce Development Project for Employers

L.E.A.D. (Learn Educate Accept Develop) is a workplace inclusion project from the Autism Foundation of Oklahoma that provides training and business solutions to employers committed to diversity and equity. L.E.A.D offers employers four trainings to learn about the benefits of hiring autistic people/people on the autism spectrum and people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, and how to attract and interview neurodiverse candidates and foster an inclusive work environment.
