The four-year certificate program aims to prepare students for successful independent living and gainful employment. ## Oklahoma is 44th in the Nation in Care for Vulnerable Populations

Tulsa-based SOAR Partners commissioned a research project with Oral Roberts University's College of Business Graduate Competitive Business Intelligence Class to compare the services available for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) in Oklahoma with other states. This study includes information about the Waitlist for the Oklahoma Developmental Disabilities Services In-Home Supports Waiver. On average, people with I/DD are on the Waitlist for 13 years. According to the study, Oklahoma ranked 44th in the nation on providing services to people with I/ DD.
