March is Developmental Disability Awareness Month. The National Association of Councils on Developmental Disabilities has made this year's theme *Beyond the Conversation*. The campaign highlights how people with and without disabilities come together to form strong communities.

March 23rd: Developmental Disabilities Awareness Day at the Capitol, 9 AM- 12 PM

Self-advocates, students, professionals, families, and parents and other caregivers are invited to participate in DD Awareness Day at the Capitol on March 23rd. This year's theme is Disability Counts. Speakers will be on the South Steps from 9-11 AM. The speakers will include self-advocates, parents, professionals, and legislators. After the speeches, people will be invited to go and meet with their legislators from 11 AM- 12 PM.

Spotlight: Remembering Judy Heumann

Judy Heumann was considered the "mother of the disability rights movement." Judy passed away on March 4th, 2023. Judy was a civil rights activist and self-advocate who believed "<u>Disability only becomes a tragedy when society fails to provide the things we need to lead our lives</u>". BEST (Building Employment Skills Today) STEP (Summer Transition Employment Program) provides a week-long employment training followed by an opportunity for up to 4.5 days a week of work for up to 25 hours each week.
