OK STABLE Now Tax Deductible

The Developmental Disabilities Council of Oklahoma and the Oklahoma Department of Human Services released <u>a new video explaining the benefits of an OK STABLE Account</u>. OK STABLE Accounts allow Oklahomans with disabilities to save and invest money without losing eligibility for benefits programs. Earnings are not taxable and also can be used as a state tax deduction, effective May 2021. For more information about the OK STABLE tax deduction, visit the Oklahoma State Treasurer's webpage.
