Notes from Dr. Valerie N. Williams,
Vice Provost for Academic Affairs & Faculty Development

From the Open Minds network as shared by Monica E. Oss, in her 11/29/18 article:

“Earlier this year, the new autism prevalence estimates came out from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)—1 in 59 children are estimated to have autism spectrum disorder (ASD) according to the CDC’s Autism and Developmental Disabilities Monitoring (ADDM) Network, up from previous estimates of 1 in 68 in 2014. According to one of three U.S. periodic surveys, these prevalence numbers are even higher: with reporting that one in 40 children—or 2.5% (1.5 million) of those between 3 and 17—have autism spectrum disorder. The statistics around adults with autism often get less press, but are just as important in thinking about the service delivery models and opportunities. A recent report shows that the cumulative incidence of ASD among adults could exceed 2.8% based on an analysis of diagnosis patterns for people born from 1980 through 2012. What does this mean? Soon, two or three out of every 100 adults in any community could be affected by ASD.”

For all professionals in direct care delivery, public health, and social work or social services these numbers suggest that there will be individuals affected by ASD in our health and social services systems whose needs may not exactly parallel those of people without ASD. We need to continue building a robust understanding about how best to serve these individuals, educate and advocate within our professional and local communities, and continue our scholarly and research efforts to identify causes, prevention and interventions that work. Enabling people to live full and productive lives that are connected with their loved ones and communities through the home, work, education, social and spiritual outlets of their choice is in the best interest of us all.

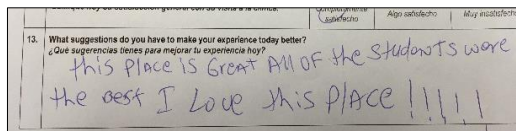

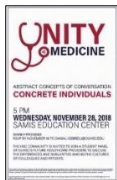

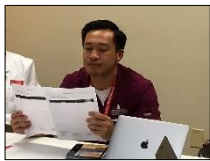

The Clinical Experience

The principle focus of the [OUHSC IPE Clinical Experience](#) is to provide students with an opportunity to reinforce the [IPEC Core Competencies for Interprofessional Collaborative Practice](#). These competencies are Communication, Roles & Responsibilities, Values & Ethics, and Teams & Teamwork. One way this is accomplished is by creating interprofessional teams of students drawn from 15 different degree tracks to provide team-based, patient-centered care at the [Good Shepherd Clinic](#) (GSC) in Oklahoma City. The GSC is located in the Midtown area and services hundreds of uninsured medical and dental patients from throughout central Oklahoma. The experience meets on Thursday evenings through March.

Nursing & the IPE Clinical Experience

In 2018-2019, nine BSN, two Clinical Nurse Specialist, and two Family Nurse Practitioner students participated in the IPE Clinical Experience. BSN students contribute in the student-nurse role by assisting with patient intake and triage, participating in acute care and/or specialty treatment, and contributing during team huddles and debriefs. Our MSN students also have opportunities to contribute to assessment, diagnosis, and treatment care plans.



The experience features a "Passport" function where nursing students and other disciplines travel through the clinic and have an opportunity to visit and observe other professions in action. The intention is for all disciplines to see nursing students in action while allowing BSN and MSN students a chance to observe how others provide care.

Teams are provided guidance by Clinical Assistant Professor Cindy Rieger and Clinical Instructor Susan Eckman.
