PAT is an evidence-based early childhood home visiting model designed to build strong communities, thriving families, and children who are healthy, safe, and ready to learn

SC is an evidence-based behavioral intervention home visitation services for high risk families, whose purpose is to meet the health, safety, and well-being needs of families with young children

SafeCare

Problem solving and Motivational Interviewing is used throughout the modules

All modules involve a baseline assessment, an intervention (training), and a follow-up assessments to monitor change



Current Challenges

- High Demand of our services several programs have a waiting list
- Difficulties finding qualified bilingual personnel, especially in the Mental Health area
- Not enough space in our building to grow or expand services
- → High volume of inquiries and request from the public and partners
- ◆ The arrival of recent immigrants with multiple stressors and needs





- Providing competent services requires an understanding of the diverse population
- Ask a person of Hispanic descent how they'd like to be identified before labeling them yourself
- The term Hispanic refers to people who speak Spanish or have a background in a Spanish-speaking country





- ◆ The term Latino refers to people who can trace their origins to Latin roots, including countries with Spanish, Portuguese, or French heritage. A Brazilian is Latino, but not Hispanic because they speak Portuguese
- Know that there are different immigration and legal statuses (Native-born citizens, foreign-born persons who have become naturalized citizens, legal immigrants with some visa, permanent residents (green card), legal refugees, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), and undocumented immigrants



- Lack of documentation/legal status brings poor employability, exploitation in jobs, inadequate housing, no option for higher education, limited access to health care, and fear of any outsider
- Knowledge of or ability to assess the acculturation levels in individuals and families is important
- Be yourself, genuine, polite, and respectful
- Make your best effort to pronounce their name correctly, and learn some basic Spanish





- Distrust is normal at first. Earn their trust
- Use cultural consultants frequently
- Be a student of your clients. They are the best teachers of their culture and needs
- If possible avoid using interpreters never use children/adolescents for their parents
- ♦ If you have to, the content of the interview will be highly dependent on the quality and training of the interpreter
