

Zomi Community in Tulsa

By some estimates, upwards of 7,000 Zomi people from Myanmar make up a thriving community in south Tulsa. It is believed to be the largest community of Zomi people in the U.S.

The Zomi/Burmese population in Tulsa has exploded in the past decade. The number of students in the school districts identified as Zomi/Burmese has gone from 71 to more than 1,000.


Afghan Refugees Coming to Oklahoma

Total Number of Arrivals in Oklahoma


Oklahoma is the state with the 3rd highest number of Afghan refugees coming into the United States.

Program Population by Language




Teen Births Trends


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Making a Difference

- Strengthened collaboration with YWCA caseworkers to better serve Afghan families.
- Increased number of Group Connections in languages other than English.
